PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails. 1 Corinthians 13:5-8 NIV

There are more stories about the origin of Valentine's Day than one can count. The most popular among Christians is that of St. Valentine, a priest who secretly performed marriages when Emperor Claudius II reportedly forbade marriage (in an effort to ensure he had soldiers without family ties). Another story says that he was a Christian imprisoned for his faith and cured his jailer's daughter of blindness. The day before his execution (supposedly Feb. 14, 269), he sent a farewell message to the daughter signed "From your Valentine." By 1450, a valentine was the name of one's sweetheart. In 1533, it was a folded piece of paper. In 1610 "valentines" were gifts given to sweethearts. In the 1800s it again meant messages exchanged by couples. Whether either of these stories is true or not, the theme of love connects all of them in some way. This is an example of how stories can be transformed and be transformational through time and space.

I believe that 1 Corinthians 13 champions the power of transformational stories. To most people who have heard it, 1 Corinthians 13 is a declaration of love and unity. It is popular at wedding and shared between couples. Interestingly enough, when the Apostle Paul wrote this 13th chapter to the church in Corinth, he was writing in response to a situation that was far from the reality or celebration of love.

Paul declared love as the greatest power in a community even though the community he was writing to seemed to be lacking in this power. Therefore, he did not write this letter to affirm a standard already present in the community. He wrote it to introduce this community to a way of living and being necessary for its survival. Paul was teaching this church community to learn its way through the difference and disagreement they were experiencing in interpersonal relationships.

The church in Corinth was not a homogenous body. Quite the contrary. It was not a comfortable gathering where people fell into step with each other because they shared fundamentally similar lives, values, and experiences. It dismantled conventional social boundaries of ethnicity, gender, age, rank, status, and life situation. While most of its members were converted Gentiles, this body also includes Jews as well. In fact, some of the Jewish members had been former synagogue leaders. Unfortunately, this diversity yielded both benefits and challenges common for any social group. For example, discord and rivalry arose, members divided into contentious groups, and some took sides with some others resulting in a fragmented community, rather than a strong community enriched by difference/diversity.

Paul in his wisdom remained firm in his vision of God's beloved diverse community. He believed that God called this community to live love. God called this community church in

Corinth to be an example of how God could and can transform divisiveness into love. He would write to the Colossians, "And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony." -Colossians 3:14.


Love is a work to be done. It is the way of life. It is a way of living. It is the call to intentionally dress oneself up in love daily. In this way, we begin to understand that Paul's words about love were not written to celebrate the unifying love already accomplished in the community. *It was a call to action.* It was not a tribute to what was. It was an intervention to instruct on what had not yet come to pass. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. said it this way, "We have before us the glorious opportunity to inject a new dimension of love into the veins of our civilization." This was Paul's God given vision of the church.

This language that Paul uses here is not to be easily digested. The point was not to make its readers feel comfortable and affirmed in love. The point was to motivate *a new action plan* among the members that secured the community's survival and concord into the future as the community of God's people joined together in perfect love. **This is love work.**

This Valentine's Day as we celebrate with candy and cards, let us also embrace this opportunity to begin to take up the work of love. This is our chance to further the legacy of love to bring about healing in a world that is broken. In order to do this work of love, we must rethink, regroup, and recommit to love, God's way. Will you accept this call to action? Will love be the work of Harrisena Community Church? Will you love as you have been loved by God? Let's do this LOVE WORK together!




FINANCE REPORT

With the help of the Ross Grant, lower expenses due to COVID-19 and the financial commitment of parishioners to Harrisena, we finished the year 2020 with a surplus balance of approximately \$17,000. This is reflected in an increase of that amount in our savings account.

What about 2021? We will apply for Ross Grant money which is never a guarantee. To date there has been a decrease of pledgers and subsequently a decrease in anticipated pledge money. Thankfully, our Savings account money will be available to make up the deficit, but this is not a sound financial practice. So, to those who have already pledged and those who are not pledged but give regularly, thank you for your continued support of Harrisena. To those members who have yet to pledge, we thank you for your support in past years and hope that you will consider once again contributing to the financial well-being of Harrisena Community Church.
