PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

THE COURAGE TO STAND

"Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" 37 And Jesus replied to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' 38 This is the first and greatest commandment. 39 The second is like it, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself [that is, unselfishly seek the best or higher good for others].' 40 The whole Law and the [writings of the] Prophets depend on these two commandments." Matthew 22:36-40 NIV

Writing in the aftermath of World War II, Elton Trueblood looked back to those few brave German Christians who had the courage to oppose Adolph Hitler. When so many others went along or simply kept silent, a few, a courageous handful, would not go along with the majority. Trueblood asked the question, "What made these people different? Why did they say no when everyone else said yes?" His answer was simple: "They had the First Commandment." That made all the difference. When you have the First Commandment, when you take it seriously as a way of life, you find **the courage to stand** against the crowd.

In the twenty-second chapter of Matthew, an expert of the law from among the Pharisees asks Jesus one last question in order to test him. He asked, "Which commandment in the law is greatest?" Jesus' answer is classic. Loving God is the first thing, the most important thing. But, with it comes a corollary: to love God means that you also love God's people. The ancient rabbis put it in similar terms: **"What is hateful to you do not do to your neighbor. That is the whole Law."**

For many, it seems that Christianity comes down to the "Golden Rule" of love your neighbor as yourself. The command to love your neighbor is actually found in the Hebrew text, Leviticus 19:18. Yet, not many verses later, we find the command to love the alien (stranger) as ourselves in Leviticus 19:34: "The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; **you shall love the stranger as yourself.**"

We currently live in an increasingly polarized political climate. We are encouraged to choose sides based on political affiliations, social and cultural categories, racial and ethnic identities. God calls us to LOVE. Love God, neighbor, and stranger. While this love of neighbor and stranger could become a new moralism, it might help us also see how the Church can rise above partisan politics and simply show God's love for all people. Churches and individuals hearing the call to "see other people as God sees them," might find that **neighbor and stranger are not such different categories after all.**

One last story:

It was a bitterly cold evening in Northern Virginia many years ago. The old man's beard was glazed by winter's frost as he waited for a ride across the river. He heard a brigade of men on horses coming around the bend. He let the first one pass him without any effort to get his attention.

Then another passed by, and another. Finally, the last rider neared, and the old man caught the rider's eye and said, "Sir, would you mind giving an old man a ride to the other side?" The rider said, "Sure, thing. Hop aboard." Seeing the old man unable to lift his half-frozen body onto the horse, the horseman dismounted and helped the old man onto the horse.

The horseman not only took the old man across the river but to his destination which was just a few miles away. As they neared the man's home the horseman was curious and he asked, "Sir, I noticed that you let several other riders pass by without making and effort to get a ride. Then I came up and you immediately asked me for a ride. I'm curious why on such a bitterly cold night that you would wait and ask the last rider. What if I had refused and left you there?"

The old man replied, "I've been around these parts for some time. I reckon I know people pretty good. I looked into the eyes of the other riders and immediately saw there was no concern for my situation. It would have been useless even to ask them for a ride. But when I looked into your eyes, kindness and compassion were there. I knew that your gentle spirit would welcome the opportunity to help me in my time of need."

Those heartwarming comments touched the horseman. "I'm most grateful for what you have said," he told the old man. "May I never get too busy in my own affairs that I fail to respond to the needs of others with kindness and compassion." With that, Thomas Jefferson turned his horse around and made his way back to the White House.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Have you ever wondered who are the people responsible for Harrisena financial affairs? According to the HCC Bylaws, the <u>Financial Officers</u> are the Financial Secretary, Cheryl Straut and Treasurers Bonnie Nadig and Ken Zacharias. Their duties are to deal with the day to day financial affairs of Harrisena and to report monthly to the Church Council. Cheryl, however, is the only person that has access to pledge records.

Harrisena also has a <u>Finance Committee</u>. It is composed of the three member Financial Team as well as, Dr. Natalie Wimberly, President of the Council, Peter Pepe and Head Trustee, Hal Payne. The duties of this committee are to develop a sound financial plan for Harrisena Community Church that includes short term and long term strategies.

The Financial Officers would like to note that thanks to the hard work of several members of the church community, the chicken barbeque catered by Dizzy Dave on May 23rd earned a \$2032 net profit. In addition to the sale of approximately 250 dinners, several people made generous donations.

As of May 26th, 43% of the fiscal pledges have been met. May 26th constitutes 40.4% of the fiscal year. This indicates that pledges are on target. A portion of this collection includes pledges paid in full for the year. Thank you for your continued financial commitment and faithfulness to Harrisena Church.

However, we are still facing a deficit proposed budget for 2020 as we await the awarding of Ross Grant money. Harrisena is fortunate to have a savings account that can be used for deficit spending, but deficit budgets cannot be supported by a savings account forever. Now is the time to begin making plans for the future of Harrisena Community Church. The Finance Committee will begin meeting in the very near future to examine various alternatives and strategies needed to develop a strong financial plan.
