PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Danielle's parents have promised to get her a dog. They have visited the animal shelter now for over a month now. Her parents are becoming a bit tired of the routine that doesn't end with a puppy for Danielle. "Danielle keeps repeating it over and over again. We've been back to this animal shelter at least five times. It has been weeks now since we started all of this," the mother told the volunteer.

"What is it she keeps asking for?" the volunteer asked. "Puppy size!" replied the mother. "Well, we have plenty of puppies, if that's what she's looking for," the volunteer added. "I know...we have seen most of them," the mom said in frustration. Just then Danielle came walking into the office.

"Well, did you find one?" asked her mom. "No, not this time," Danielle said with sadness in her voice. "Can we come back on the weekend?" The two women looked at each other, shook their heads and laughed. "You never know when we will get more dogs. Unfortunately, there's always a supply," the volunteer said. Danielle took her mother by the hand and headed to the door. "Don't worry, I'll find one this weekend," she said.

Over the next few days both mom and dad had long conversations with her. They both felt she was being too particular. "It's this weekend or we're not looking anymore," Dad finally said in frustration. "We don't want to hear anything more about puppy size either," Mom added.

Sure enough, they were the first ones in the shelter on Saturday morning. By now Danielle knew her way around, so she ran right for the section that housed the smaller dogs. Tired of the routine, mom sat in the small waiting room at the end of the first row of cages. There was an observation window so you could see the animals during times when visitors weren't permitted.

Danielle walked slowly from cage to cage, kneeling periodically to take a closer look. One by one the dogs were brought out and she held each one. One by one she said, "Sorry, you're not the one."

It was the last cage on this last day in search of the perfect pup. The volunteer opened the cage door and the child carefully picked up the dog and held it closely. This time she took a little longer. "Mom, that's it! I found the right puppy! He's the one! I know it!" she screamed with joy. "It's the puppy size!" "But it's the same size as all the other puppies you held over the last few weeks," Mom said. No, not size... sighs. When I held him in my arms, he sighed," she said. "Don't you remember? When I asked you one day what love is, you told me love depends on the sighs of your heart? The more you love, the bigger the sigh!"

The two women looked at each other for a moment. Mom didn't know whether to laugh or cry. As she stooped down to hug the child, she did a little of both.

"Mom, every time you hold me, I sigh. When you and Daddy come home from work and hug each other, you both sigh. I knew I would find the right puppy if it sighed when I held it in my arms," she said. Then holding the puppy up close to her face she said, "Mom, he loves me. I heard the sighs of his heart!"

Have you ever laid you head down on someone's chest and heard the sighs of their heart? If you were to do that you had to be pretty close to the individual whose heart you heard.

Close your eyes for a moment, see your head lying on the bosom of God. Listen to sighs of God's heart. Hear the rhythm of Love. Connect to the intimacy, friendship, and affection of God's heart. Accept the embrace of God's grace. Rest in God's wisdom. Now, keep listening. Is your heart beating at the same rate as God's? Is your heart aligned with God's heart?

"This is love indeed--we did not love God, but God loved us and sent His Son to be an atoning sacrifice for our sins." (1 John 4:10 NIV)

So often I experience the sighs of God in the arms of loved ones, in the caress of a sunset, the kiss of the moonlight, and the gentle brush of cool air on a hot day. Where do you hear the sighs of God's heart?

For the next five (5) days, make time each day to stop and listen to the heart of God; you may be surprised at what you hear. Festus (1839) sc. 5, said, "We should count time by heart-throbs." I also read somewhere that life is not measured by the breaths we take, but by the moments that take our breath away.

THE PURPOSE-DRIVEN CHURCH

Every church has a controlling factor, a dominant influence, or an overarching philosophy, mindset, conviction, or attitude that affects and directs everything it does.

In 1995, Rick Warren wrote the book entitled **THE PURPOSE-DRIVEN CHURCH.** You may have heard of it. As you may know, the book was written primarily for pastors and church leaders. In this book, Warren advises church leaders to base their ministry on God's purposes, not their own ideas of ministry. Warren suggests **five purposes** that guide effective churches. They are **Worship, Fellowship, Discipleship, Ministry and Mission.** These purposes, Warren claims, are derived from Matthew 22:37-40 (The Great Commandment) and Matthew 28:19-20 (The Great Commission).

Warren's book is based on one basic truth: that **every church is driven by something.** He suggests that there are seven things that drive most churches: **Tradition, finances, programs, personalities, events, seekers and even buildings** can each be the controlling force in a church.

The **tradition-driven church** is a church that is captivated by what God did yesterday. It is a church committed to perpetuating the past. Change is almost always viewed as bad, and stagnation is almost always viewed as stability. The tradition-driven church is a church that is committed to the seven last words of the church, "WE'VE NEVER DONE IT THAT WAY BEFORE."

In the **personality-driven church**, the pastor or some powerful church member is the dominate force. This type of church tends to take on the personality of the dominate leader and its agenda is set more by the will of the leader than by the will of God. If the dominant leader dies or leaves the church, this type of church finds itself seriously crippled.

For the **finance-driven church**, the number one question is "HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?" and the number one activity in this type of church is fundraising. Ministry, discipleship and evangelism all take a backseat to money matters in a finance-driven church.

The **program driven church** is program focused. Its goal is simply to perpetuate programs, regardless of whether or not the program has outlived its usefulness and regardless of whether or not it is meeting the needs of the people.

Some churches are **driven by buildings**. In this type of church, the majority of the church's financial and human resources are spent on paying for and maintaining the building. Funds earmarked for ministry have to be diverted to pay the mortgage or fix constant problems, and the ministry to the people suffers.

Other churches are **driven by events**. The calendar of an event-driven church is packed with activity, but in the church, there is very little productivity. The main focus in an event-driven church is to boost attendance at the events, with little regard for actual ministry or discipleship.

And still other churches are **driven by seekers**. These kinds of churches forget all the other Biblical purposes of the church and just focus on attracting lost people.

Warren suggests that *the only thing that should drive God's Church are God's Purposes*. God's purposes should be our priorities, and God's purposes are revealed in God's Word. We must be clear about God's priorities, God's purposes, and God's perspectives so that we can be clear about our own.

WHAT IS A PURPOSE DRIVEN CHURCH?

- A **church driven by God's Biblical purposes**, not by our personal plans, programs, or personalities.
- A church which seeks TO GROW WARMER THROUGH FELLOWSHIP, DEEPER THROUGH DISCIPLESHIP, STRONGER THROUGH WORSHIP, BROADER THROUGH MINISTRY, AND LARGER THROUGH EVANGELISM.
- A church that seeks to evaluate everything it does against the five purposes of the church. (Warren 1995)
